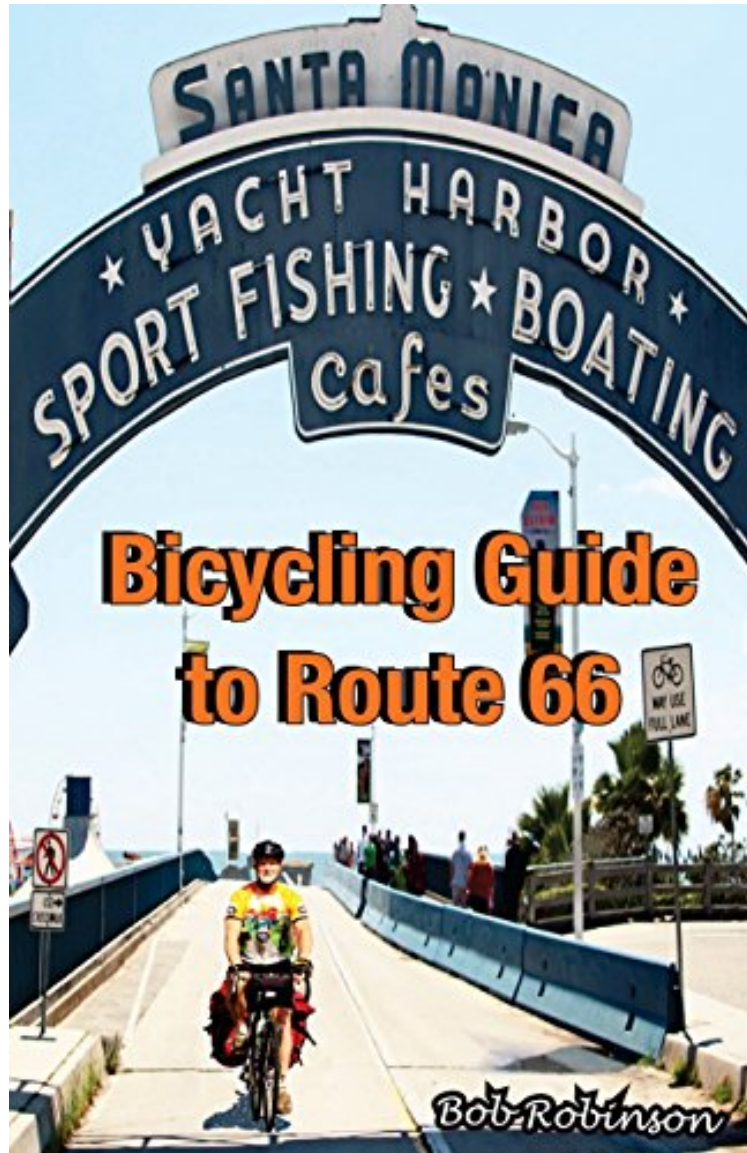


Bicycling Guide to Route 66

mileage detail. It would be far better to see the map first, get the idea of where we are going and then we can see the details, if we care to. Only value here is a few mentions of things unique to a given area but, truthfully, these too are all on internet. Even these will quickly become stale so you need to stay online anyway.
