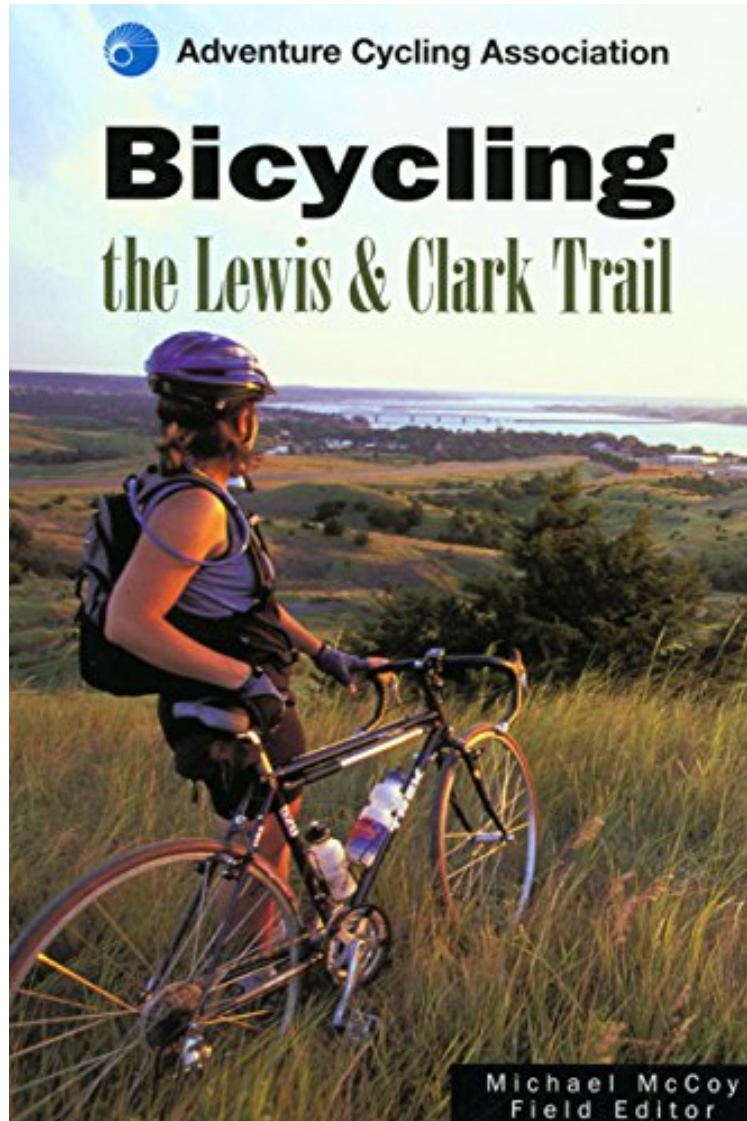

A section of the route is profiled with a map an essay portion describing the sights must stops along that section. There is some description of the campground, town or motel they stayed at. I used Robinson's "Guide to the Mississippi River Trail" last year (2012)

which is similar except the MRT guide had a list of miles amenities: convenience stores, campgrounds, restaurants, motels and the like that this guide didn't have but with the A.C. maps listing the helps along the way it wouldn't be a big deal. A list of services is also of questionable value anyway as places close open since the guide was written. The guide is still worth reading before your Adventure a must along the way. I also recommend purchasing highway maps of each state you will bicycle through before you go (difficult to find maps on the road). You only need to take the map section containing the route these maps may (probably will) prove valuable when you want to leave the route for food, repairs, lodging, or to avoid a detour or hazardous road (Williston area of North Dakota the oil fields). This book, Adventure Cycling Association maps (and updates), and state hwy. maps your route would be complete indeed. I was missing the last dozen pages of my book from Daily Deals when contacted inquiring what to do: exchange (if possible), return or maybe even receive the missing pages they voluntarily refunded the cost had me keep the book.
