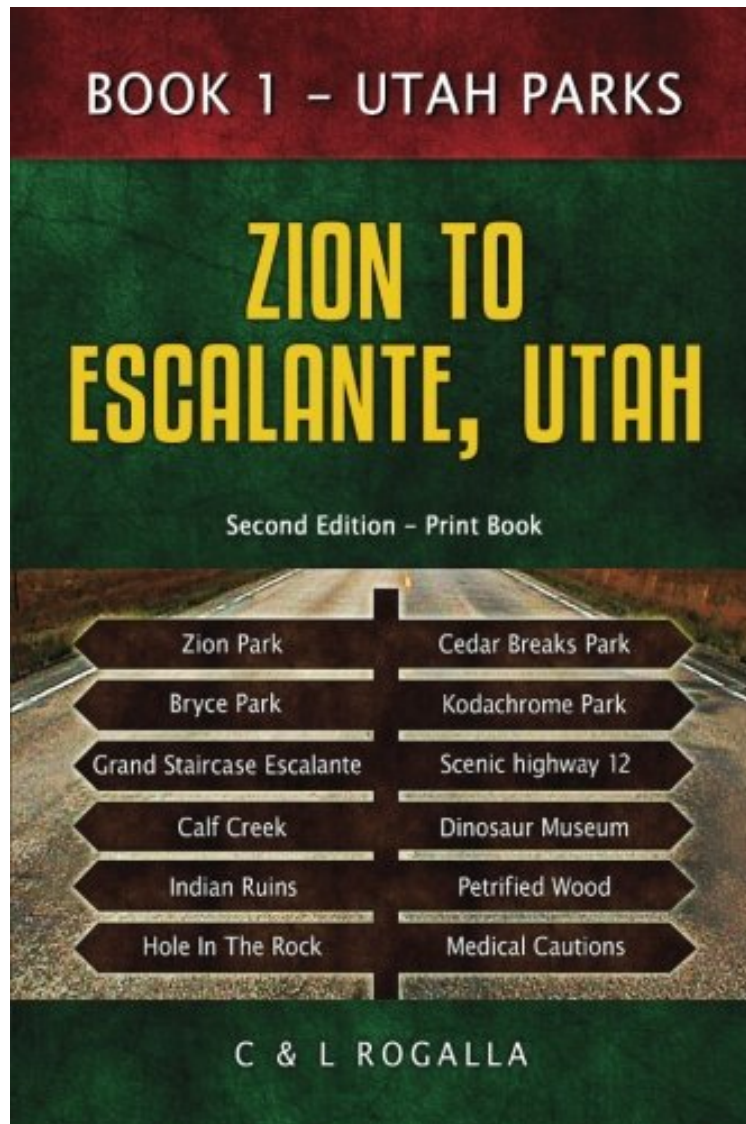

Book Tour Content This book is a combination of driving, walking, mountain biking and other tours such as rafting and horseback riding. There are suggestions of what to see and do, for each tour. There are approximately 140 photographs and 15 critical Internet sites. Where applicable, we have included free camping areas. History Embedded in this land is the enduring history of pioneers who settled here when it was barren except for native Indian occupation. Appendix 5 Tour sites and location maps. Use these maps as a guide for each Trip and applicable sub-tours. Most of these road maps were created by GPS tracking; therefore, very accurate.
