Great chunks of the remaining 34 pages are taken up with large generic pictures and lots of blank space. From what there is of actual text, you will glean that El Paso has hotels, restaurants and museums and thats about extent of it. Example: The author lists a total of 5 hotels, thats for a city with a population of about 680,000 thousand people. The description for each hotel is bare bones. The author does not offer an opinion on the establishment or explain why you should patronize it. This booklet is obviously cobbled together from the internet. Surely it only took a few moments and some software to spit out this sad effort. Im guessing thats how the author has been able to research a Long Weekend Guide title for around 70 other cities.
