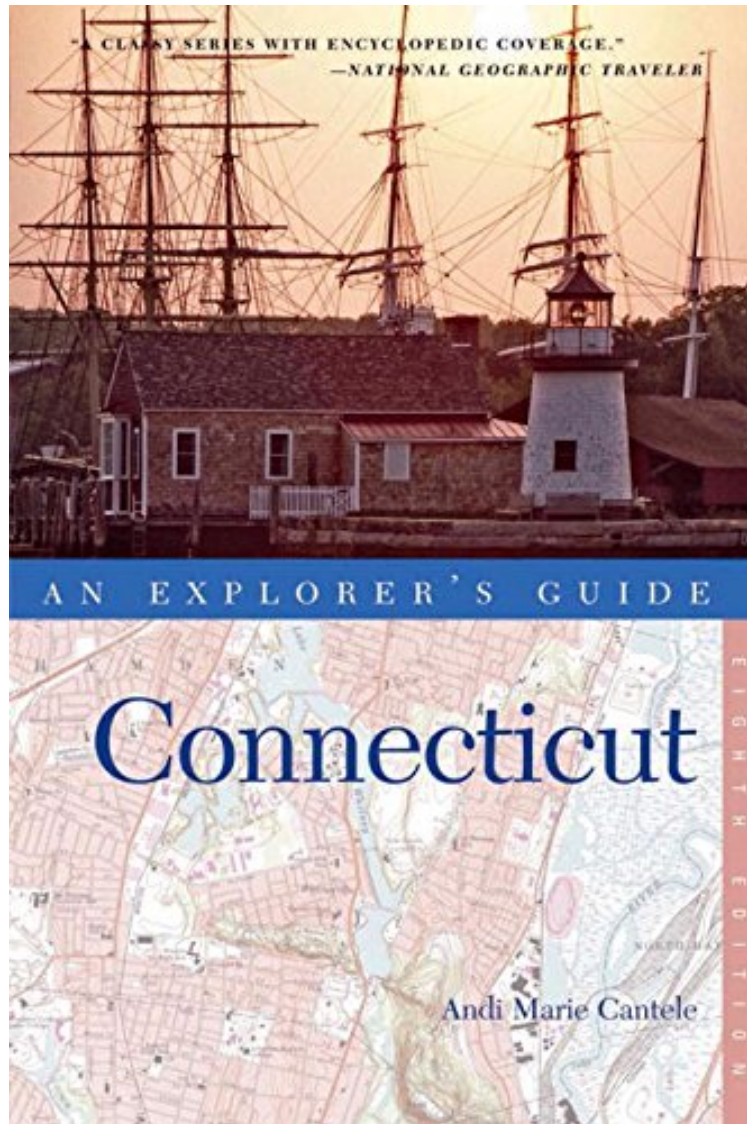

sense of the state and what it has to offer. Author Andi Marie Cantele has put together a guide to the entire state, not just the top ten tourist attractions. Along the way, it is possible to get a sense of how the different sections of the state are surprisingly unique in their own way...The guide opens with an introduction to the State of Connecticut, then explores by section: The Gold Coast of New York City commuters; the Litchfield Hills with a segment of the Appalachian Trail and some surprisingly rugged ground; Hartford, Connecticut's big city and capital; The Quiet Corner of rural Northeast Connecticut; the Mystic seacoast, with the state's biggest tourist attractions; and the Lower Connecticut River Valley where it reaches the ocean. Each section features commentary, accommodations, places to stay and to eat, and things to see and do. The sections include some basic sketch maps and a few (black and white) photographs. There is some repetition in the commentary, but it is a worthwhile read, likely to be very useful to the visitor and those who plan to stay.
