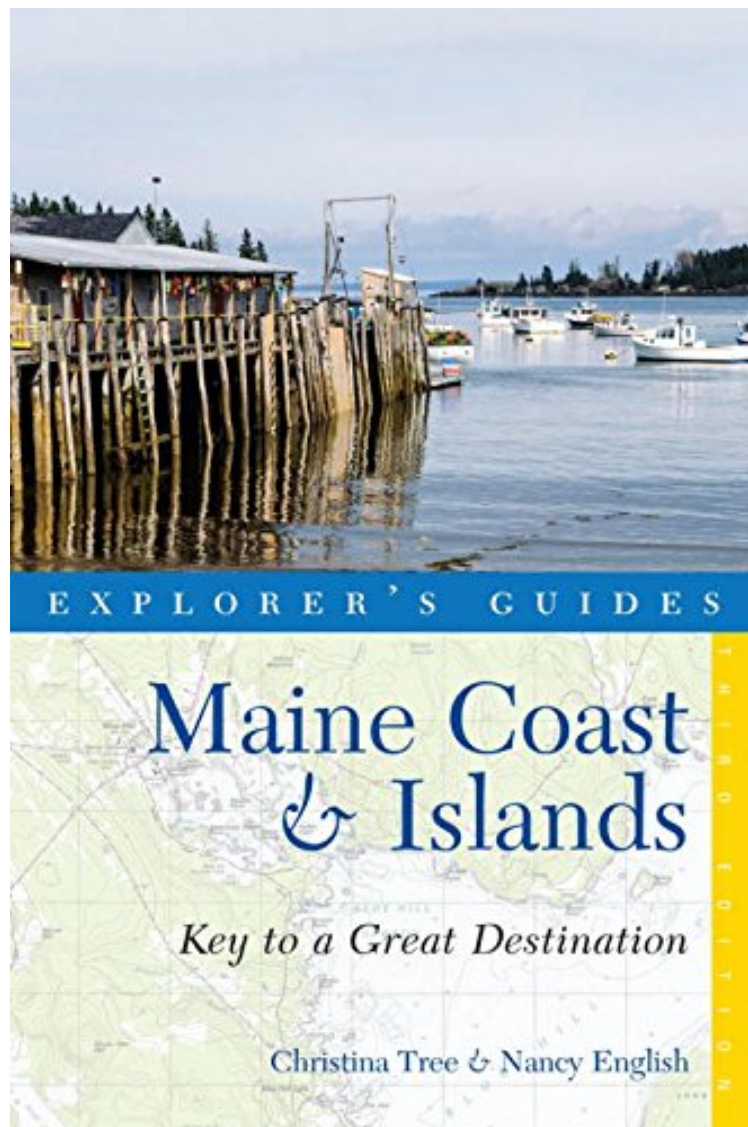

"The Explorer's Guide: Maine Coast Islands" might be just the right planning resource. Authors Christina Tree and Nancy English have written many useful earlier guides to Maine. This one follows the coast from Kittery to Lubec with a great narrative supplemented by maps and pictures. The book opens with an introduction to the State of Maine, followed by a series of chapters that address each portion of the coast, from the long beaches in southern Maine to the rugged coastline around the Harpswells and Boothbay to the mountains of Acadia and the underdeveloped way-Downeast. The introductory chapter has some good practical advice on traveling in Maine. The regional chapters have a surprising amount of commentary and useful details on what to see, where to stay, and what to eat. The Maine Coast in all its beauty and variety is there to be explored and appreciated, especially in summer. The authors note the tourist season extends into September, but many attractions and accommodations are full in high summer and closed in winter. It plays to plan ahead.
