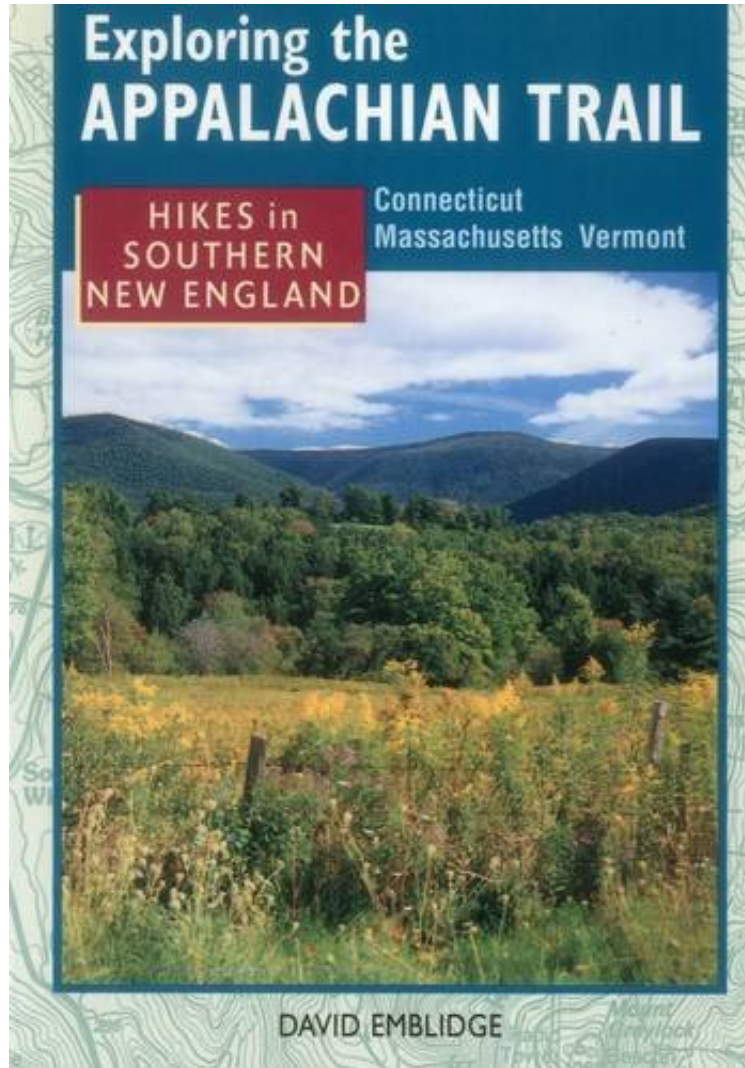

Appalachian Trail passed through my area but I had no idea where to start or how to find the trailheads. I just knew I wanted to hike the A.T. This book was perfect. I used it to plan a series of day hikes through Connecticut in 2012. The good: the maps and visuals are very helpful. The elevation map is good to have to plan for how difficult the hikes will be. The mileage charts were very useful and many landmarks were included in each hike so you could figure out where you were on the hike. Each hike has information on the area (geological or historical) that I found extremely informative. I learned so many new things and the book put me in a mindset to learn things on my own. The not so good: The book is dated and, believe it or not, has a reference to the World Trade Center in it (purchased in 2011). There are several hikes where I disagreed with the authors about where to end the hike. There was one in particular (Housatonic Meadows in Connecticut) where they had me take a 1.5 mile side trail to exit the trail. I had to take the same non-A.T. trail to rejoin where I left off. This added more time and distance than most hikers will probably want. Use the book as a guide, get a good atlas and you can figure out some more reasonable start and stop locations for some of the hikes.
