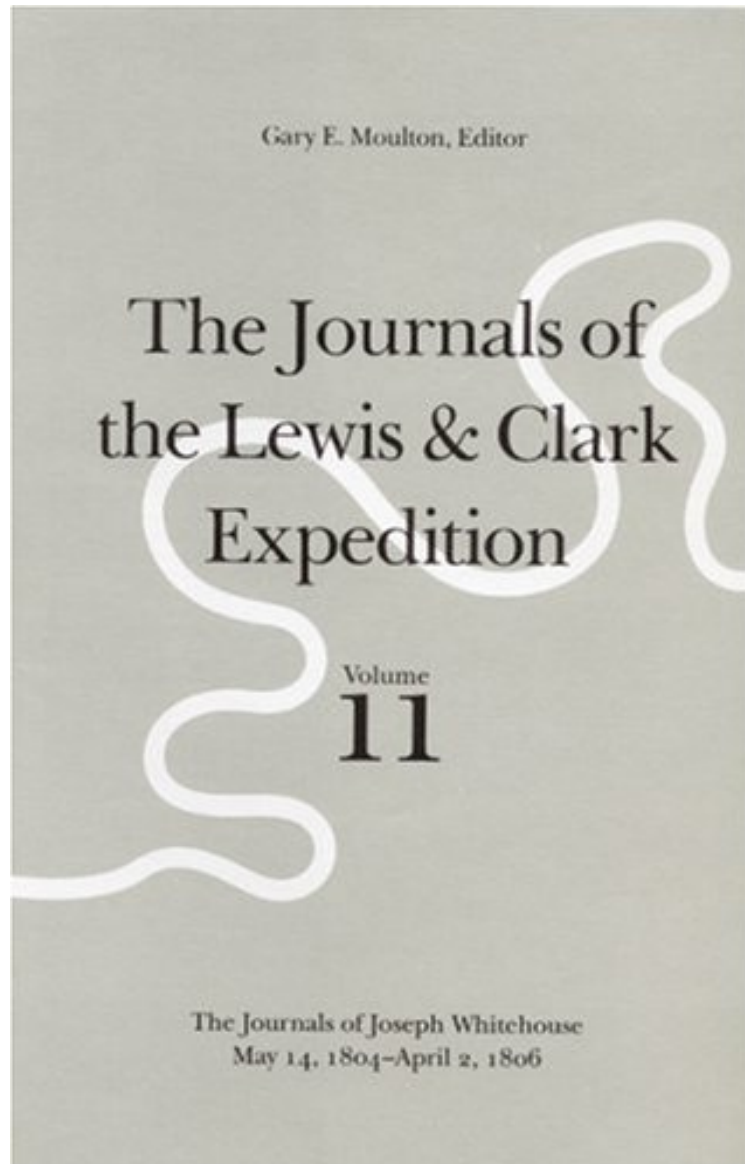

The University of Nebraska Press editions of The Journals of the Lewis and Clark Expedition are widely heralded as a lasting achievement. In all, thirteen volumes are projected, which together will provide a complete record of the expedition.

From Library JournalThe only surviving journal by a private in the Lewis and Clark expedition is that of Joseph Whitehouse, which is in two versions: an original that goes to November 1805 and a fuller and longer paraphrased version (extending to April 1806) discovered in 1966, known as the "fair" copy. Editor Moulton (history, Univ. of Nebraska, Lincoln) has arranged the paraphrased entry after the original entry of the same date. As with the earlier volumes of the journals (LJ 3/1/87), this volume is fully annotated, although Moulton refers readers to those volumes if the annotation would simply repeat an earlier one.
