In the mid-1890's he and a buddy had the idea, took a train to Green River, Wyoming, built their boat in a week and proceeded to run the entire river to the Gulf of California. He was first to run a flat bottomed boat using oars with the oarsman facing downstream. Their only portage in the Grand Canyon was Soap Creek!
