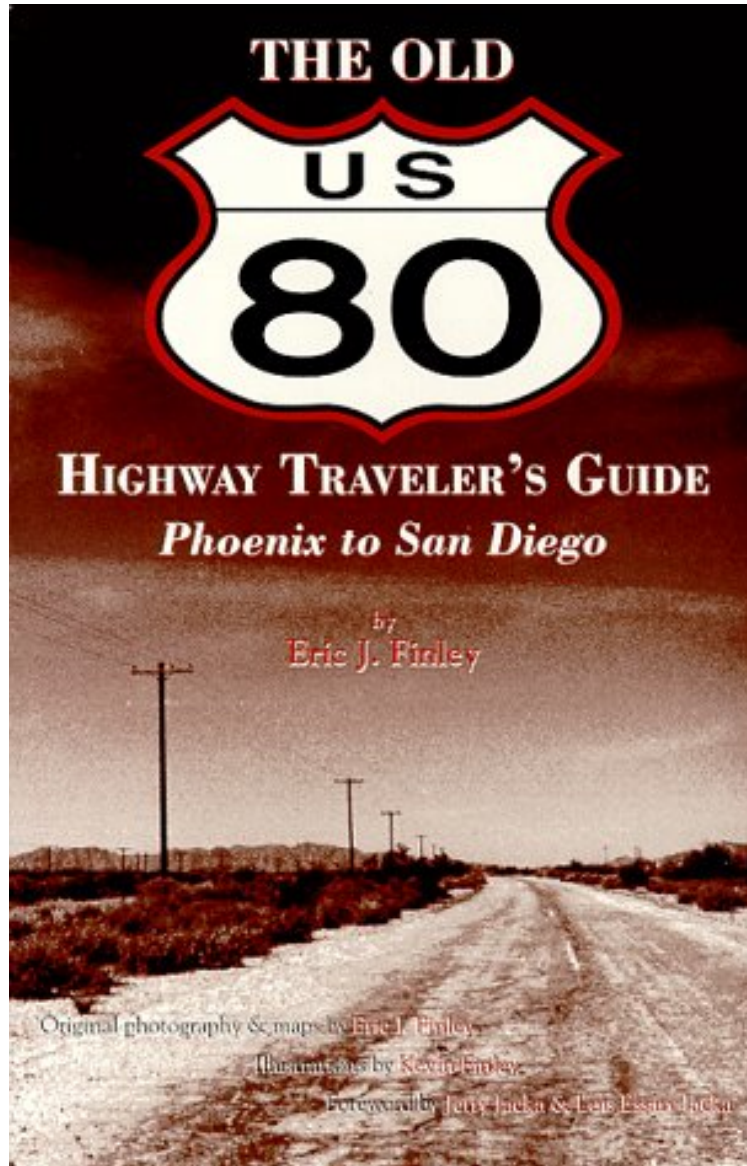

13 in 1965. One marvels at the variety of landscapes that it covers, and the historical associations it is connected with. From the long stretch between Phoenix and Yuma (which is reminiscent of the terrain seen in the chase in the film THELMA AND LOUISE), past the former prison town and now thriving desert community of Yuma, along the desert route of the old plank road between Yuma and El Centro (some of the planks survive to this day), through the agricultural oasis of the Imperial Valley, going up over the Laguna Mountains and the San Diego backcountry, recently scarred by fire but still a great asset to this area), and finally winding down into San Diego proper, this highway covers every conceivable terrain. US 80 doesn't have the current popularity of Route 66 or the Lincoln Highway but, as the "All-Year Southern Route" for "Coast-to-Coast" travel in the early days of the automobile, it was once one of the more important roadways in America. This is a great "roadie" book with plenty of history, sightseeing tips, and those details that help you put together your own two-lane experience. No longer marked as a major transcontinental thoroughfare, the path of old Route 80 in the West nonetheless survives in the form of a hodgepodge of lesser roads. For many years now, the seemingly disconnected segments of what was once called "the Broadway of America" have been largely abandoned and left to time. But now, author Eric Finley invites readers to re-explore the forgotten pavement, history, and sites of "the old road" in The Old U.S. 80 Highway Traveler's Guide (Phoenix-San Diego). Finley is a writer, editor, and voice talent who holds a B.A. degree in Communications with a minor in speech from Grand Canyon University in Phoenix, Ariz. He has earned several awards for public speaking and photography and is or has been a member of several organizations, including the Society for Technical Communication, the Historic Route 66 Association of Arizona, the Oregon-California Trails Association, the Fabulous Fifties Ford Club of Arizona, and the Pontiac-Oakland Club International. A contributor to Route 66 Magazine, The Old U.S. 80 Highway Traveler's Guide (Phoenix-San Diego) is his first book. His lifelong interest in road travel and eventual interest in historic highways led him to write and submit his first magazine article at the age of 15.
